Business Agent's Report

As of this publication there are 260 Members actively seeking employment with 61 of them being Apprentices and 26 Members on travel jobs. For the month of July we dispatched 113 Journeymen and 25 Apprentices, with 17 call backs and 32 travel requests. For the month of August we dispatched 141 Journeymen and 55 Apprentices, with 27 call backs and 11 travel requests.

Infrastructure improvements continue at the Newport Vermillion Rise site. August 20th there was a pre-bid meeting for installation of a new water transmission main. It will consist of 12,250 feet of 24" ductile iron pipe that will connect to existing facilities and the demolition of the existing water main. Hopefully as improvements are made, the site will become more attractive to companies for future construction.

Sycamore Engineering was low bidder on the Holiday Inn renovation at I-70 and 3rd St in Terre Haute. I don't have any details at this time on possible manpower needs but I will keep you informed as more information is available.

As usual work will be slowing down the closer we get to winter. Sugar Creek is the only sizeable powerhouse outage scheduled for the fall of this year. There are going to be some travel opportunities for this fall and winter with the majority of it being in Ohio.

I would like to welcome all of our new incoming Apprentices and wish them good luck in our trade. Also I would like to congratulate our new Journeymen on completion of our Apprenticeship Program and wish them many years of prosperity.

We still have a shortage of combo welders. Just a reminder to everyone that the Training Center is open Monday through Friday for any member who would like to hone their welding skills or practice to get a certification.

Financial Secretary Treasurer's Report

Another Labor Day has come and gone. We celebrated with parades, cookouts, and all the regular holiday events. But what is the history behind the holiday and why should we care?

Labor Day was originally intended as a day to allow the public to appreciate the work of trade and labor organizations.

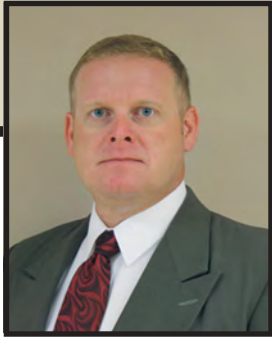
Labor Day originated during one of American labor history's most turbulent time periods. In the late 1800s, the average American worked 12-hour days and seven-day weeks in order to make a basic living. Children as young as 5 or 6 worked in mills, factories and mines across the country, earning a fraction of the adult wage. People often faced extremely unsafe working conditions, with insufficient access to fresh air, sanitary facilities and breaks.

As manufacturing increasingly replaced agriculture as the source of American employment, labor unions began organizing strikes and rallies to protest poor conditions and compel employers to renegotiate hours and pay. Many of these events turned violent including the infamous Haymarket Riot in Chicago where policemen and workers were killed. In September of 1882, 10,000 workers took unpaid time off to march from City Hall to Union Square in New York City, basically holding the first Labor Day parade in U.S. history.

In June of 1894, the American Railroad Union, led by Terre Haute native and five time presidential candidate Eugene V. Debs, called for a boycott of all Pullman railway cars, crippling railroad traffic nationwide. To break the strike, the federal government dispatched troops to Chicago, unleashing a wave of riots that resulted in the deaths of more than a dozen workers. In the wake of this massive unrest and in an attempt to repair ties with American workers, Congress passed an act making Labor Day a legal holiday.

Union members earn on average, 27 percent higher wages than non-union members. Unionized workers are 60 percent more likely to have pensions and 79 percent of union workers have jobs that provide health insurance benefits. Unions help employers create a more stable, productive workforce. Most importantly, Unions help bring workers out of poverty and into the middle class.

I would like to thank everyone who helped make our Labor Day events and our Union picnic a success once again this year. Working together for a common goal is what we do best.



Field Representative's Report Darrek Davis

Labor Day has come and gone marking the end of summer. It was great to be able to spend time with the Members at the parades and picnic. Our strong showing at these events is even more proof as to why we are the best and strongest Union in the area.

Our work continues to remain steady, obviously not where we would like to be with Members still on the Out of Work List. But we are holding our own. Work at the Marathon Refinery remains very good with almost 200 Members employed amongst the contractors onsite. We could see this number increase by 20-30 in the coming weeks with the talk of some additional projects between now and the end of the year.

We also have our people onsite at the bio-diesel expansion in Danville. With this project being an entire new facility from the ground up it is going to take some time to get to the projected peak manpower of 50. In conversations with the contractor I am guessing it will be sometime in December.

The best thing about both of these projects is it will provide steady employment throughout the winter and well into next year.

Fall also marks another exciting time for the Local because it is the completion of the 5 year journey for our newly graduated apprentices and the beginning of the road for our newly selected first year class. These men and women are the heartbeat of this organization. It's the changing of the guard if you will as our older Members retire and the new generation enters our industry.

Granted there are some pretty big shoes to fill, but I have no doubt this can and will be accomplished. Our training department and the dedication of our instructors is second to none. These are the folks who teach our apprentices the professionalism and craftsmanship that Local 157 is known for throughout the country.



Field Representative's Report Steve Snyder

Work outlook continues to be positive for the upcoming third quarter in the Northern part of our jurisdiction.

Subaru Automotive work is still looking positive for the next several months ahead. Work has plateaued for the building mechanical systems contractors currently working on the Paint Shop Addition. They are in the process of hydro testing the piping systems and commissioning various pieces of equipment. The remaining specialty piping contractors are off to a delayed start due to unforeseen design issues and other various construction delays. I anticipate hiring to increase on this front in the weeks ahead as more areas open up

and design resolutions become available.

Tate and Lyle's North Plant work continues for Freitag & Weinhardt as they aggressively pursue work at this location. I was also notified that Freitag & Weinhardt was the low bid on another industrial project at Purdue University's chiller plant on the North side of campus.

The Honors College campus dorms at Purdue are steadily making progress as concrete and rebar moves forward. I expect hiring to start in the very near future and remain strong for some time. Shambaugh & Sons current work crew has been making job preparations and working on logistics which in turn is shaping this project up to be a fast track build.

The Active Learning Center at Purdue lags the Honors College current schedule with foundation walls and footers still being laid out and installed. This will be another strong labor project for the not so distant future. D A Dodd has been making plans for fabrication and other offsite building opportunities to leverage the current down time into production time.

I had the opportunity once again to make it up to Ann Arbor this year for the annual Instructors Training Program. I attended the Industry Promotional Day that the UA puts together for end users. On this particular day the entire campus is on display with group escorts touring the facilities as our instructors and apprentices are in the process of competing and training. This is quite the show of our talent on a national level and I am excited about exploiting this day next year to various end users in our jurisdiction. To all our Local 157 Instructors I want to say thank you for your commitment and professionalism. Your hard work and dedication makes Local 157 a tier one skilled trade. Keep up the good work!

I am happy to report that the mission of the Local 157 Golf Outing of having a good time and relaxing with coworkers away from the work environment was accomplished. While there are several items on the agenda for improvement for next year's outing this year's outing was a success. I would especially like to thank D A Dodd, Lafayette Hardware and Project Design Piping for helping to sponsor Greens for this outing. I also want to thank Greg Thoennes and Jeff Casto for allowing us to start this up again after nearly a six year lull. I look forward to improving this outing for next year and please, if anyone is interested in helping fill free to call me at any time.

By the time most of you are reading this the Labor Day festivities have come and went for another year. I truly hope that everyone who participated this year whether it was in Danville, Lafayette, Terre Haute or Palestine had a wonderful time. I also want to thank all our Members and Officers who spent a lot of time putting these things together as well as manning the booths and games, another job well done.

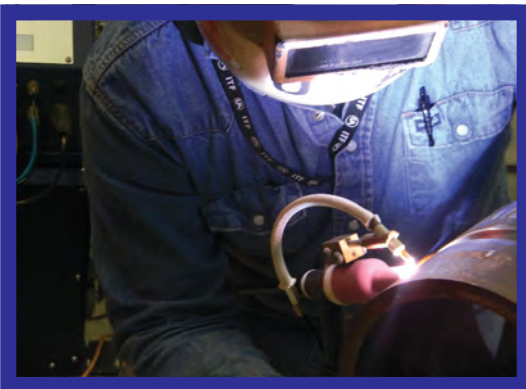

During the months of June and July 2015 your Health & Welfare Plan staff processed 14,920 claims, totaling \$5,800,802.72.

In this article, I would like to state the Initial Eligibility rules for active employees.

Initial Eligibility shall begin on the first day of the second month following any calendar quarter during which an Employee works and is credited with three hundred (300) hours or more of covered employment for an Employer or Employers and payment for the same at the applicable rate is received from said Employer or Employers by the Plan Office.

In the event that a Participant works less than three hundred (300) hours in his/her initial calendar quarter or his/her Employer(s) make(s) payment for less than three hundred (300) hours, the Participant may pay the difference in order to meet the Initial Eligibility requirements. Payment shall be in an amount equal to the difference in the hours reported and three hundred (300) multiplied by the applicable Employer contribution rate and may only be made at the beginning of the initial Benefit Quarter.

Indiana Pipe Trades Defined Contribution Pension Plan Reminder

In addition to the Employer (Contractor) contribution of \$1.00 per hour into your Indiana Pipe Trades Defined Contribution Pension Plan, this is a reminder that a 401(k) variable contribution is also a feature to the Plan.

This 401(k) variable contribution feature allows you to contribute, on a pre-tax basis, elective contributions to your individual participant account. These elective contributions can be made in specific dollar amounts of \$1, \$2, \$3, \$4, \$5, \$6 or \$7 per hour. An Internal Revenue Service dollar limit of \$18,000 applies for 2015.

You may change your 401(k) variable contribution rate at the time of hire for each participating Employer (Contractor), and if working continuously with the same participating Employer (Contractor) the 401(k) variable contribution rate may change not more than once the first six (6) months of each year and not more than once the last six (6) months of each year thereafter. These 401(k) variable contributions can be managed just like you manage your current account.

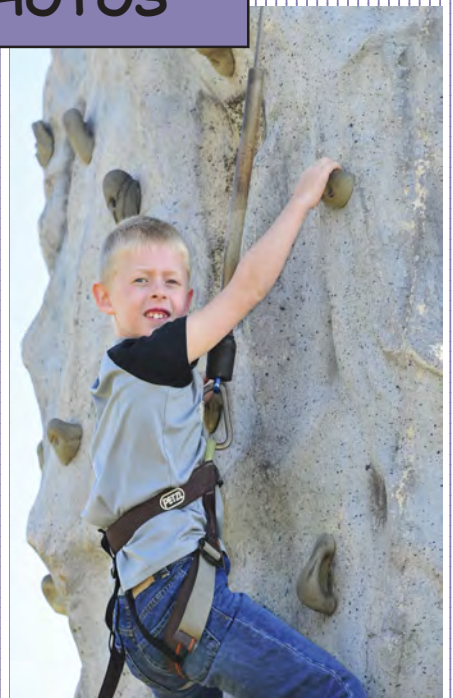
