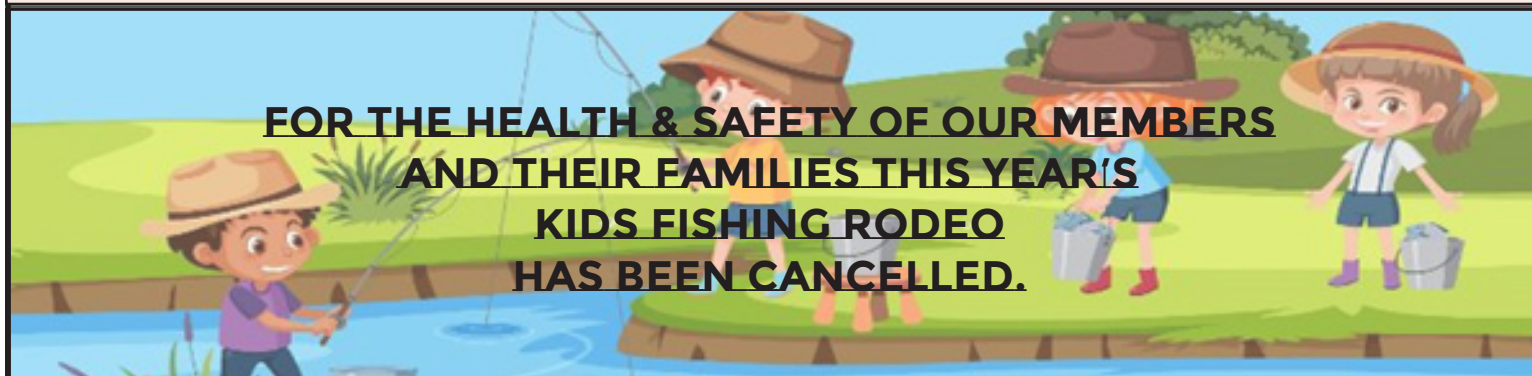

## Business Manager's Report

Everyone should have received a robotext informing them of the June Union Meeting cancellation and letting everyone know that there will be a May 20th Officer's Meeting. At this meeting we will discuss and then vote on the allocation of the \$1.00 raise to best serve Local 157 and it's membership. Then we will need to purchase cleaning materials to do nightly sanitizing and cleaning of all the classrooms. There are a lot of unknowns that we will be looking at prior to the start of the 2020/2021 school year. We hope by the time of our July Quarterly meeting the gathering number will stay high enough for us to conduct a union meeting.

In closing, these are trying times and it's very hard to look to what the future will bring and how long it will take this world to resemble what it was before this pandemic. It does not appear that we will see anything close to normal for some time so we need to figure out how we can be as safe as possible and survive in this environment.

## Business Agent's Report

As of this publication there are 179 journeymen and 51 apprentices actively seeking employment with 99 journeymen and 16 apprentices working on travel jobs. For the month of March we dispatched 81 journeymen and 23 apprentices with 7 call backs and 42 members to travel jobs. For the month of April we dispatched 84 journeymen and 9 apprentices with 35 call backs and 39 members to travel jobs.

As all of you are aware the world as we know it has changed in a very short period of time causing many uncertainties and future work in our jurisdiction is no exception. I wish I could give you all an educated report concerning our scheduled projects but to be honest about it there are too many variables to give a truthful answer. I will keep you informed as more information comes available concerning local projects. We have been getting a few people to work in Local 136 and Local 440 but most travel work is on hold. Difficult times present difficult decisions and we have collectively had to make many of those over the last few months.

The last thing we wanted to do was cancel our Union meetings and shut down our training but we had no choice. We will hold a meeting May 20th with your elected officers to discuss the allocation of our raise coming July 1st. As trustees we will be requesting \$.20 for the Educational Trust Fund. The cost of opening school in the fall will be extremely more costly than ever with the purchase of masks, hand sanitizer and disinfectant to ensure the safety and health of our apprentices and instructors.

We are unaware of what will transpire over the next few months but we are preparing for the worst and hoping for the best. We have come to the realization that until there is a vaccine we must be prudent in our effort for the safety and health of ourselves, our families and our Union brothers and sisters. Republican or Democrat, both sides have politicized the Covid-19 pandemic. If nothing else this should be an eye opener that most politicians are more concerned about their money and themselves more than the welfare of you and I. I urge you to follow the recommendations of the CDC and not those of politicians. Take precautions, if not for yourself, for your family, friends and those around.

During the months of February and March 2020, your Health and Welfare Plan staff processed 14,838 claims, totaling \$5,911,374.99.

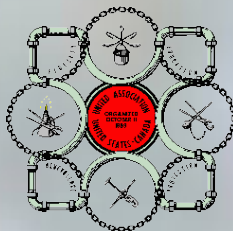
In the midst of the Coronavirus pandemic, I would like to recap some temporary changes the Plan has made regarding COVID-19 testing and maintenance drug refills. The Plan will cover COVID-19 testing and supplies at 100% (no member cost share) when medically necessary and appropriate according to the accepted guidelines of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and/or your state's Department of Health. The Plan will also allow earlier refills for prescribed maintenance drugs at retail and mail order. Please contact the Plan's prescription benefit manager, SavRx, at [www.savrx.com](http://www.savrx.com) or by phone at (866) 912-7425 for more information or to inquire about receiving your medications through mail order. To prevent the spread of the virus, wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, and if soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol; Avoid touching eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands; Avoid close contact with people who are sick; Stay home when sick; Cover coughs or sneezes with tissues or cough into the elbow area, then discard the tissue in the trash and follow up with handwashing; and, Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces regularly.

Please note that [www.livehealthonline.com](http://www.livehealthonline.com) is your telehealth provider, providing convenient access to Board-certified physicians on a remote basis, 24/7, at a \$0 copay. If you choose to seek care at a physician's office, please call your health care provider before you go, and tell them about your travel, if applicable, and your symptoms. They may give you instructions on how to get care without exposing other people to your illness.

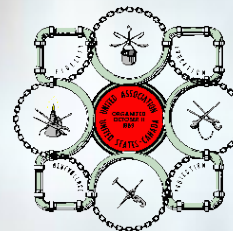

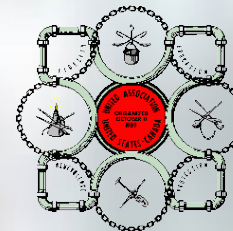

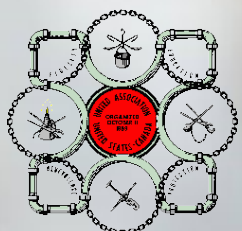

## Know how it spreads

- There is currently no vaccine to prevent coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19).
- **The best way to prevent illness is to avoid being exposed to this virus.**
- The virus is thought to [spread mainly from person-to-person](#).
  - Between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet).
  - Through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs, sneezes or talks.
  - These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs.
  - Some recent studies have suggested that COVID-19 may be spread by people who are not showing symptoms.



## Wash your hands often

- [Wash your hands](#) often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds especially after you have been in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.
- If soap and water are not readily available, **use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol**. Cover all surfaces of your hands and rub them together until they feel dry.
- **Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth** with unwashed hands.

## Avoid close contact

- **Avoid close contact with people who are sick, even inside your home.** If possible, maintain 6 feet between the person who is sick and other household members.
- **Put distance between yourself and other people outside of your home.**
  - Remember that some people without symptoms may be able to spread virus.
  - [Stay at least 6 feet \(about 2 arms' length\) from other people.](#)
  - Do not gather in groups.
  - Stay out of crowded places and avoid mass gatherings.
  - Keeping distance from others is especially important for [people who are at higher risk of getting very sick](#).

## Cover your mouth and nose with a cloth face cover when around others

- You could spread COVID-19 to others even if you do not feel sick.
- Everyone should wear a [cloth face cover](#) when they have to go out in public, for example to the grocery store or to pick up other necessities.
  - Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.
- The cloth face cover is meant to protect other people in case you are infected.
- Do NOT use a facemask meant for a healthcare worker.
- Continue to keep about 6 feet between yourself and others. The cloth face cover is not a substitute for social distancing.

## Cover coughs and sneezes

- **If you are in a private setting and do not have on your cloth face covering, remember to always cover your mouth and nose** with a tissue when you cough or sneeze or use the inside of your elbow.
- **Throw used tissues** in the trash.
- Immediately **wash your hands** with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, clean your hands with a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.

## Clean and disinfect

- **Clean AND disinfect [frequently touched surfaces](#) daily.** This includes tables, doorknobs, light switches, countertops, handles, desks, phones, keyboards, toilets, faucets, and sinks.
- **If surfaces are dirty, clean them.** Use detergent or soap and water prior to disinfection.
- **Then, use a household disinfectant.** Most common EPA-registered household disinfectants will work.
