## Business Manager's Report

### Mark W. Swaner

Since my last column spring in the Midwest has gotten warmer and wetter but has been a nice change from winter.

First of all, our Health & Welfare has given all three locals in our plan the option of using Health Gauge in our local jurisdictions. Health Gauge promotes an annual screening to detect your risk for stroke, heart issues & diabetes by means of an ultrasound screening and ablood work screening. We do believe that screenings will help our membership to be healthier and save future cost to our Health & Welfare fund. The first screening will be held at the Terre Haute meeting hall on Saturday, June 25, from 6:00 am to 12:00 pm. After this first screening is complete, we will be scheduling another one in the northern part of our jurisdiction. You must schedule your appointment. See Page 7 for complete details.

I hope everyone has received their letter pertaining to the changes in our National Pension Fund. Plan year as of July 1, 2021 for the National Pension Fund has gone green and certified safe so the Trustees have decided to remove the cap of 35-years maximum that a participant can accrue for retirement in pension credits. So, everyone retiring on or after January 1, 2022 will have no limit on the number of years of future service credit that they acquire for retirement. This is great news.

On Friday night May 6th at our local union meeting, we did vote on the upcoming \$1.00/hr of our contract raise and it goes as follows; \$0.27 cents on the check that brings us to \$40.00, \$0.25 cents Health & Welfare that is now \$10.25, \$0.20 in our IPT that brings it to \$2.30, \$0.20 cents into our HRA that comes to \$0.65 cents, \$0.01 cent into the Advancement Fund bringing that fund to \$0.15 cents and \$0.07 cents into our National Pension Fund, bringing it to \$5.70.

In closing I would like to congratulate and thank all graduating apprentices that received their diploma at the IVY Tech commencement ceremony May 5th. Thank you for representing Local 157 well!

## Business Agent's Report

### *Wilbur E. "Webb" Crouch III*



As of this publication there are 178 journeymen and 26 apprentices actively seeking employment with 93 members on travel jobs. For the month of March, we dispatched 127 journeymen and 22 apprentices with 19 call backs and 58 members to travel jobs. For the month of April we dispatched 73 journeymen and 16 apprentices with 7 call backs and 16 members to travel jobs.

Freitag currently has a crew on site at Wabash Valley Resources proposed hydrogen plant. They are performing discovery work to see what will need replaced in order to utilize the gasification process. BMWC has a crew at Steel Dynamics working on utility extensions for the new \$250 million expansion. This project will be out for bid in the next few weeks. A&R Mechanical was the successful bidder on the Danville Casino and hired to first two 157 members April 27th. This job will peak at approximately 6 people and the completion date is February of 2023.

In the last few weeks, I have met with several contractors and conducted pre-job conferences or will be conducting them soon on the following projects in Danville: The Nugget Casino, Fed Ex Distribution Center, Armstrong School, VA Municipal Building, VA building 98, Salt Fork School, Jamaica School, Crestwood School in Paris, and the Hershey Gateway expansion project. Most of these projects will only take a few people but they all add up. It is refreshing to see our Illinois jurisdiction picking up work.

The bidding process for the Terre Haute Casino should be starting soon. I will keep you posted when we hear who the successful bidders are.

I would like to congratulate our Apprentices on graduating from Ivy Tech with an Associates Degree.

Save the date for the Annual Kids Fishing Rodeo, it will be held June 11th and registration is from 8am to 8:30 am with fishing from 8:30 to 11:30, lunch and bait will be provided and there will be prizes for each age group.

I also want to welcome Josh Sullivan. Josh will be our OQ Trainer and Proctor for OQ Testing (Operator Qualifications) with our Gas Distribution Division. Josh comes to us from Ohio Valley Gas working as a Trainer for them. Welcome to 157's Training Department.

## Field Representative's Report

### *Stephen Snyder*

The work demand for our skilled members is at the most volatile that I have ever witnessed. Several factors have contributed this uncertainty. The obvious is the massive supply chain and inflation impact that has pushed owners, both public and private, to reject bids or value engineer (VE) several projects that, under normal circumstances, should be going full speed at this time. This requires time to seek out additional appropriations from the governing boards before contracts are awarded. The other major issue appears to be the massive amount of ARP (American Rescue Plan) monies that are available for repair and replacement of our crumbling infrastructure. This has caused a massive spike for the demand for all Engineering services. As

I have stated before, no occupation is immune to the shortage of workers including seasoned engineers of all types and walks. This is yet another hurdle we face not only as a region but as a country. So "what does this mean to you?" It means work is coming and it is coming slow. Projects are going to be longer and less intense with labor loading, meaning instead of 20 pipefitters 6 weeks it will be 6 pipefitters 20 weeks. (example) As this new business model begins to take hold, and the market correction of our depleted workforce auto-corrects itself, employment will continue to rise for our members.

Now on to report on some bright spots of movement for employment opportunities in our Northern region since my last report.

The partnership that Purdue recently announced with the Air Force Research Laboratory has created quite abuzz among the region. The Regional Research Hub will give birth to a technology ecosystem that could change the landscape as we know it. I have already witnessed the results of this plan with further financial commitments in the works for some major players in the industry. None of this has been publicly announced as negotiations are on-going. Purdue has a rich history in the aeronautic fields which makes this new partnership with the USAF a natural transition. The Hypersonic Mach 8 lab currently under construction has started to hire for the plumbing and mechanical installations. Quality Plumbing and Heating was awarded this project. Off to a slow start, this project will start moving forward as quick as possible depending on economic trends as stated in the first paragraph.

The 53-million-dollar Schleman/Stewart Hall renovation CMC RFI has been awarded to Wilhelm Construction. Bid package one has been awarded to DA Dodd. This package includes site utility extensions, cut/cap and demolition. The larger mech. new install package is scheduled to be released for bidding in the months ahead. DA Dodd was also awarded the HillTop apartments heating upgrades for the dorms.

Commercial Air has been awarded the plumbing mech. portion of the 60-million-dollar Klondike Elementary school. This project has been in the works for several years. The school board has worked very hard putting this together and has recognized the urgency of now with respect to the changing construction markets. As forecasted, this project is over budget and is under going alternate selections to keep things on track. This was the splash CAI wanted to build a local workforce to aggressively pursue additional works in this area.

The heavy industrial work is still moving despite disruptions. Our market share of this industry continues to increase as retirements and attrition continues to strain the maintenance (or lack of) workforce employed by many of our largest manufacturers.

NUCOR Steel announced a major investment into the Crawfordsville plant with a commitment to invest \$290 million dollars on a new line. The start of this project is scheduled for the 3rd quarter of 23. This will undoubtedly be a very large and slow project that will require a heavy demand for welders and pipefitters in the months ahead. I will update as information is available, however, I am aware of some large contracts that are set to be inked in the coming days. I will report on this when the ink is dry on a contract. We still have crews at Wabash National, Rea Magnet Wire, General Electric, Subaru Industrial, Heartland Automotive, NHK and Raybestos in Crawfordsville to name a few. Both IU Health and St. Francis Hospitals continue to use our skilled workforce to improve and update their facilities as healthcare continues to lead the charge in life saving work. The Sisters of Saint Francis has announced plans for a \$43 million dollar Cancer Center. Tonn and Blank is currently working on scope and bid documents. No schedule information has been released yet.

Our service department is going forward at yet another record pace. Refrigeration techs are currently in high demand as our work load continues to remain heavy in this market. Supply chain issues and new equipment have turned this industry into the most critical going forward. As equipment becomes more unavailable customers have to resort to fixing what they own at all cost until new equipment becomes available.

In closing I want to congratulate all our new Journeymen who graduated our 5-year apprenticeship program. This milestone achievement is not an end of your education but a beginning. The next 5 years of your time in the field will define your skills and ability and keep in mind that failure is the recipe of success. Good luck and God Speed!

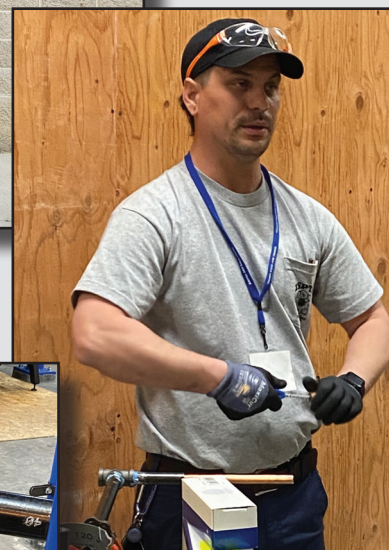

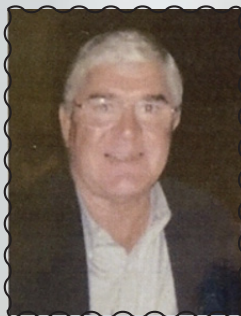

## Stay Sun-Safe Outdoors

- Seek shade, especially during midday hours. This includes 10 am to 4 pm, March through October, and 9 am to 3 pm, November through February. Umbrellas, trees, or other shelters can provide relief from the sun.
- Be extra careful around surfaces that reflect the sun's rays, like snow, sand, water, and concrete.
- Wear sun protection gear like a hat with a wide brim and sunglasses to protect your face and eyes.
- Sunglasses protect your eyes from UV rays and reduce the risk of cataracts and other eye problems. Wrap-around sunglasses that block both UVA and UVB rays offer the best protection by blocking UV rays from the side.
- Wear a long-sleeved shirt and pants or a long skirt for additional protection when possible. If that's not practical, try wearing a T-shirt or a beach cover-up.
- Apply a thick layer of broad spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher at least 15 minutes before going outside, even on cloudy or overcast days. Reapply sunscreen at least every 2 hours and after swimming, sweating, or toweling off.

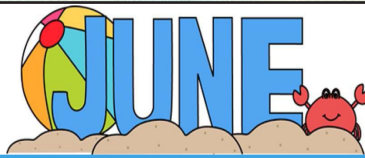

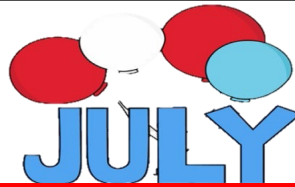

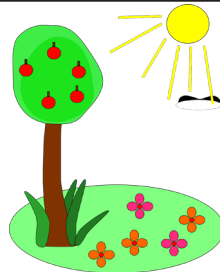
